What to do if you have a welfare concern in Delightful Gems Childcare Services

Why are you concerned?

For example

- Something a child has said e.g. allegation of harm
- Child's appearance may include unexplained marks as well as dress
- Behaviour change
- Witnessed concerning behaviour

Act immediately and record your concerns. If urgent, speak to a DSL first.

Follow the settings procedure

- Reassure the child
- Clarify concerns, using open questions if necessary (TED: Tell, Explain, Describe)
- Use child's own words, record facts not opinions.
- Sign and date your records
- Seek support for yourself if required from DSL or LADO

Inform the Designated Safeguarding Lead (Oluwabunmi Bakare) or refer if appropriate

Designated Safeguarding Lead

- Consider whether the child is at immediate risk of harm e.g. unsafe to go home
- Access the Kent Safeguarding Support Level Guidance document and procedures: www.kscmp.org.uk
- Refer to other agencies as appropriate e.g. Internal or community services, early help open access, LADO, Police or Request for Support for integrated children's services

If unsure then consult with Area Education Safeguarding Advisor (03301 651 200) or Local Authority Social Worker at the Front Door on 03000 411 111 (Outside office hours - 03000 419 191

If you are unhappy with the response

Staff:

- Follow local escalation procedures
- Follow whistleblowing procedures

Children and Parents:

Follow setting complaints procedures.

Record decision making and action taken in the child's child protection file

Monitor

Be clear about:

- What you are monitoring e.g. behaviour trends, appearance etc.
- How long you will monitor
- Where, how and to whom you will feedback and how you will record

Review and **request further support** if necessary

At all stages, the child's circumstances will be kept under review
The DSL/Staff will request further support if required to ensure the **child's safety** is

paramount

1. Child Focused Approach to Safeguarding

'Every child deserves the best possible start in life and the support that enables them to fulfil their potential. Children develop quickly in the early years and a child's experiences between birth and age five have a major impact on their future life chances. A secure, safe and happy childhood is important in its own right.' Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS) 2021

1.1 Introduction

- Delightful Gems Childcare Services believes that all those directly involved with our setting have an essential role to play in
 making it safe and secure. Our setting aims to create the safest environment within which every child can achieve their full
 potential and we take seriously our responsibility to promote the welfare and safeguard all the children and young people
 entrusted to our care.
- Delightful Gems Childcare Services recognises our statutory responsibility to safeguard and promote the welfare of all
 children. Safeguarding is everybody's responsibility and all those directly connected (staff, volunteers, governors, leaders,
 parents, families, and children) are an important part of the wider safeguarding system for children and have an essential role
 to play in making this community safe and secure.
- Delightful Gems Childcare Services believes that the best interests of children always come first. All children (defined as those up to the age of 18) have a right to be heard and to have their wishes and feelings taken into account and all children regardless of age, gender, ability, culture, race, language, religion or sexual identity, have equal rights to protection.
- I and any staff working with children at Delightful Gems Childcare Services will maintain an attitude of 'it could happen here'
 where safeguarding is concerned. When concerned about the welfare of a child, we will always act in the best interests of
 the child and if any member of our community has a safeguarding concern about any child or adult, they should act and act
 immediately.
- As part of the safeguarding ethos of the setting we are committed to:
 - o Maintaining children's welfare as our paramount concern
 - Providing an environment and culture in which children feel safe, secure, valued, and respected, confident to talk openly and sure of being listened to
 - o Developing appropriate and positive relationships between children and the adults that care for them
 - Providing suitable support and guidance so that children have a range of appropriate adults who they feel confident to approach if they are in difficulties
 - Using learning opportunities to increase self-awareness, self-esteem, assertiveness, and decision making. This is so
 that young children develop a range of contacts and strategies to ensure their own protection and understand the
 importance of protecting others
 - Working with parents/carers to build an understanding of the setting's responsibility to ensure the welfare of all children including the need for referral to other agencies in some situations
 - Ensuring all staff have regular and appropriate training (including induction) to enable them to recognise the signs and symptoms of abuse and ensure they are aware of the setting's procedures and reporting mechanisms
 - Monitoring children who have been identified as 'in need' including the need for protection, keeping confidential records which are stored securely and shared appropriately with other professionals.
 - o Developing effective and supportive liaison with other agencies.
- The procedures contained in this policy apply to all staff, including and governors, temporary or third-party agency staff and volunteers).
- Delightful Gems Childcare Services adheres to the Kent Safeguarding Children Multi-Agency Partnership (KSCMP) safeguarding children procedures. The full KSCMP procedures document and additional guidance relating to specific safeguarding issues can be found on the KSCMP website: www.kscmp.org.uk

1.2 Policy Context

- This policy has been developed in accordance with the principles established by the Children Acts 1989 and 2004 and has
 due regard to the related guidance. This includes:
 - DfE Keeping Children Safe in Education 2021 (KCSIE)
 - Working Together to Safeguard Children 2018 (WTSC)
 - o Ofsted: Education Inspection Framework'
 - Framework for the Assessment of Children in Need and their Families 2000
 - Kent and Medway Safeguarding Children Procedures (Online)
 - Early Years and Foundation Stage Framework 2021 (EYFS)

- This policy has been implemented to ensure compliance with section 3, the safeguarding and welfare requirements of the EYFS.
- Delightful Gems Childcare Services is currently operating in response to coronavirus (Covid-19), however, our safeguarding
 principles, remain the same. We will continue to follow government guidance and will amend this policy and our
 approaches, as necessary.
 - As a result of the Covid-19 pandemic some members of our community may have been exposed to a range of
 adversity and trauma including bereavement, anxiety and in some cases increased welfare and safeguarding risks.
 We will work with local services, such as health and the local authority, to ensure necessary support is in place.

1.3 Definition of Safeguarding

- Working Together to Safeguard Children (2018) states that safeguarding and promoting the welfare of children is defined as:
 - protecting children from maltreatment.
 - o preventing impairment of children's mental and physical health or development.
 - ensuring that children grow up in circumstances consistent with the provision of safe and effective care; and
 - o taking action to enable all children to have the best outcomes.
- It also reminds us that safeguarding "is everyone's responsibility" and everyone who comes into contact with children and
 families has a role to play. Everyone should consider wider environmental factors in a child's life that may be a threat to their
 safety and/or welfare.
- The setting acknowledges that safeguarding includes a wide range of specific issues including (but not limited to):
 - Abuse and neglect
 - Bullying, including cyberbullying
 - Children with family members in prison
 - Children Missing Education (CME)
 - Child missing from home or care
 - Child Sexual Exploitation (CSE)
 - Child Criminal Exploitation (CCE)
 - Contextual safeguarding (risks outside the family home)
 - County lines and gangs
 - Domestic abuse
 - o Drugs and alcohol misuse
 - o Fabricated or induced illness
 - Faith abuse
 - o Gender based abuse and violence against women and girls
 - o Hate
 - Homelessness
 - Human trafficking and modern slavery
 - Mental health
 - Nude or semi-nude image sharing, aka youth produced/involved sexual imagery or "Sexting"
 - Online safety
 - Peer on peer abuse
 - Preventing radicalisation and extremism
 - Private fostering
 - Relationship abuse
 - Serious violence
 - o Sexual violence and sexual harassment
 - o So-called 'honour-based' abuse, including Female Genital Mutilation (FGM) and forced marriage
 - Upskirting
- Annex B of 'Keeping Children Safe in Education' (KCSIE) contains important additional information about specific forms of abuse and safeguarding issues. Staff at the setting who work directly with children will read this annex.
- If staff have any concerns about a child's welfare, they should act on them immediately. They should follow this policy and speak to the Designated Safeguarding Lead Oluwabunmi Bakare.

1.4 Policy Compliance, Monitoring and Review

- Delightful Gems Childcare Services will review this policy at least annually (as a minimum) and will update it as needed, so
 that it is kept up to date with safeguarding issues as they emerge and evolve, including lessons learnt. The policy will also be
 revised following any national or local updates, significant local or national safeguarding events and/or learning, and/or any
 changes to our own procedures.
- Parents/carers can obtain a copy of the Child Protection Policy and other related policies on request. Additionally, our
 policies can be viewed via our website: www.delightfulgemschildcareservices.co.uk
- The policy forms part of our development plan and will be reviewed annually.

1.5 Members of Staff

- The EYFS 2021 requires providers 'to take all necessary steps to keep children safe and well" and accordingly, everyone
 involved in the care of young children has a role to play in their protection. All members of staff in the setting are part of
 the wider safeguarding system for children and are in a unique position to observe any changes in a child's behaviour or
 appearance.
- All members of staff have a responsibility to:
 - O Provide a safe environment in which children can learn.
 - Be aware of the indicators of abuse and neglect so that they can identify cases of children who may need help or protection.
 - Know what to do if a child tells them that he or she is being abused or neglected and understand the impact abuse and neglect can have upon a child.
 - o Be able to identify and act upon indicators that children are, or at risk of developing mental health issues.
 - O Be prepared to identify children who may benefit from early help.
 - Understand the early help process and their role in it.
 - O Understand the settings safeguarding policies and systems.
 - Undertake regular and appropriate training which is regularly updated.
 - Be aware of the process of making referrals to children's social care and statutory assessment under the Children Act 1989.
 - Know how to maintain an appropriate level of confidentiality.
 - o Reassure children who report concerns that are being taken seriously and that they will be supported and kept safe.

1.6. Children

Children have a right to:

- Feel safe, be listened to, and have their wishes and feelings taken into account.
- Confidently report abuse, knowing their concerns will be treated seriously and knowing that they can safely
 express their views and give feedback.
- Receive help from a trusted adult.
- o Learn how to keep themselves safe, including online.

1.6 Parents and Carers

Parents/carers have a responsibility to:

- Understand and adhere to the relevant policies and procedures.
- o Identify behaviours which could indicate their child is at risk of harm including online.
- Seek help and support from the setting or other agencies.

2. Child Protection Procedures

2.1 Recognising Indicators of Abuse and Neglect

- All staff are made aware of the definitions and indicators of abuse and neglect as identified by Working Together to Safeguard Children (2018), EYFS 2021 and Keeping Children Safe in Education 2021. This is outlined locally within the Kent Support Levels Guidance.
- Delightful Gems Childcare Services recognises that when assessing whether a child may be suffering actual or potential harm there are four categories of abuse:

- Physical abuse
- Sexual abuse
- Emotional abuse
- Neglect

All staff should be aware that abuse, neglect, and safeguarding issues are rarely standalone events that can be covered by one definition or label. In most cases multiple issues will overlap with one another.

Abuse: a form of maltreatment of a child. Somebody may abuse or neglect a child by inflicting harm, or by failing to act to prevent harm. They may be abused by an adult or adults or another child or children. It should be noted that abuse can be carried out both on and offline and be perpetrated by men, women, and children.

Sexual abuse: involves forcing or enticing a child or young person to take part in sexual activities, not necessarily involving a high level of violence, whether or not the child is aware of what is happening. The activities may involve physical contact, including assault by penetration (for example rape or oral sex) or non-penetrative acts such as masturbation, kissing, rubbing, and touching outside of clothing. They may also include non-contact activities, such as involving children in looking at, or in the production of, sexual images, watching sexual activities, encouraging children to behave in sexually inappropriate ways, or grooming a child in preparation for abuse (including via the internet). Sexual abuse is not solely perpetrated by adult males. Women can also commit acts of sexual abuse, as can other children.

Signs that MAY INDICATE Sexual Abuse

- Sudden changes in behaviour and performance
- Displays of affection which are sexual and age inappropriate
- Self-harm, self-mutilation or attempts at suicide
- Alluding to secrets which they cannot reveal
- Tendency to cling or need constant reassurance
- Regression to younger behaviour for example thumb sucking, playing with discarded toys, acting like a baby
- Distrust of familiar adults e.g. anxiety of being left with relatives, a childminder or lodger
- · Unexplained gifts or money
- Depression and withdrawal
- · Fear of undressing for PE
- Sexually transmitted disease
- Fire setting

Physical abuse: a form of abuse which may involve hitting, shaking, throwing, poisoning, burning or scalding, drowning, suffocating or otherwise causing physical harm to a child. Physical harm may also be caused when a parent or carer fabricates the symptoms of, or deliberately induces, illness in a child.

Signs that MAY INDICATE physical abuse

- Bruises and abrasions around the face
- Damage or injury around the mouth
- Bi-lateral injuries such as two bruised eyes
- Bruising to soft area of the face such as the cheeks
- Fingertip bruising to the front or back of torso
- Bite marks
- Burns or scalds (unusual patterns and spread of injuries)
- Deep contact burns such as cigarette burns
- Injuries suggesting beatings (strap marks, welts)
- Covering arms and legs even when hot
- Aggressive behaviour or severe temper outbursts.
- Injuries need to be accounted for. Inadequate, inconsistent, or excessively plausible explanations or a delay in seeking treatment should signal concern.


Emotional abuse: the persistent emotional maltreatment of a child such as to cause severe and adverse effects on the child's emotional development. It may involve conveying to a child that they are worthless or unloved, inadequate, or valued only insofar as they meet the needs of another person. It may include not giving the child opportunities to express their views, deliberately silencing them or 'making fun' of what they say or how they communicate. It may feature age or developmentally inappropriate expectations being imposed on children. These may include interactions that are beyond a child's developmental capability as well as overprotection and limitation of exploration and learning, or preventing the child participating in normal social interaction. It may involve seeing or hearing the ill-treatment of another. It may involve serious bullying (including cyberbullying), causing children frequently to feel frightened or in danger, or the exploitation or corruption of children. Some level of emotional abuse is involved in all types of maltreatment of a child, although it may occur alone.

- Over reaction to mistakes
- Lack of self-confidence/esteem
- Sudden speech disorders
- Self-harming
- Eating Disorders
- Extremes of passivity and/or aggression
- Compulsive stealing
- Drug, alcohol, solvent abuse
- Fear of parents being contacted
- Unwillingness or inability to play
- Excessive need for approval, attention, and affection

Neglect: the persistent failure to meet a child's basic physical and/or psychological needs, likely to result in the serious impairment of the child's health or development. Neglect may occur during pregnancy as a result of maternal substance abuse. Once a child is born, neglect may involve a parent or carer failing to: provide adequate food, clothing, and shelter (including exclusion from home or abandonment); protect a child from physical and emotional harm or danger; ensure adequate supervision (including the use of inadequate care givers); or ensure access to appropriate medical care or treatment. It may also include neglect of, or unresponsiveness to, a child's basic emotional needs.

Signs that MAY INDICATE neglect.

- Constant hunger
- Poor personal hygiene
- Constant tiredness
- Inadequate clothing
- Frequent lateness or non-attendance
- Untreated medical problems
- Poor relationship with peers
- Compulsive stealing and scavenging
- · Rocking, hair twisting and thumb sucking
- Running away
- Loss of weight or being constantly underweight
- Low self esteem
- By understanding the indicators or abuse and neglect, we can respond to problems as early as possible and provide the
 right support and services for the child and their family. All members of staff are expected to be aware of and follow this
 approach if they are concerned about a child:

In all cases, if staff are unsure, they will always speak to the DSL (Oluwabunmi Bakare).

2.2 Responding to Child Protection Concerns

- If staff are made aware of a child protection concern, they are expected to:
 - o listen carefully to the concern and be non-judgmental.
 - only use open questions to clarify information where necessary, e.g. who, what, where, when or Tell, Explain, Describe (TED).
 - not promise confidentiality as concerns will have to be shared further, for example, with the DSL and potentially Integrated Children's Services.
 - be clear about boundaries and how the report will be progressed.

- o record the concern in line with setting record keeping requirements.
- inform the DSL as soon as practically possible.
- The DSL should always be available to discuss safeguarding concerns.
- Delightful Gems Childcare Services will respond to concerns in line with the Kent Safeguarding Children Multi-Agency Partnership procedures (KSCMP).
 - The full KSCMP procedures and additional guidance relating to reporting concerns and specific safeguarding issues can be found on their website: www.kscmp.org.uk
 - Specific information and guidance to follow with regards to accessing Early Help and Preventative Services and/or Children's Social Work Services as part of Integrated Children's Services (ICS) in Kent can be found here: www.kelsi.org.uk/support-for-children-and-young-people/integrated-childrens-services
- Where a child is suffering, or is likely to suffer from harm, or is in immediate danger, a 'request for support' will be made
 immediately to Integrated Children's Services (via the 'Front Door') and/or the police, in line with KSCMP procedures.
 - The DSL may seek advice or guidance from their Area Education Safeguarding Advisor from the Education Safeguarding Service before deciding next steps.
 - They may also seek advice or guidance from a social worker at the Front Door service who are the first point of contact for Integrated Children's Services (ICS).

In the event of a request for support to the Front Door being necessary, parents/carers will be informed and consent to this will be sought by the DSL in line with guidance provided by KSCMP and ICS. Parents/carers will be informed of this, unless there is a valid reason not to do so, for example, if to do so would put a child at risk of harm or would undermine a criminal investigation.

• All staff are aware of the process for making request for support referrals for statutory assessments under the Children Act 1989, along with the role they might be expected to play in such assessments.

2.3 Recording Concerns

- All safeguarding concerns, discussions and decisions, and reasons for those decisions, will be recorded in writing on the setting safeguarding incident/concern form and passed without delay to the DSL.
- Records will be completed as soon as possible after the incident/event, using the child's words and will be signed and dated
 by the member of staff. Child protection records will record facts and not personal opinions. A body map will be completed if
 injuries have been observed.
- If there is an immediate safeguarding concern the member of staff will consult with a DSL before completing the form as reporting urgent concerns takes priority.
- If members of staff are in any doubt about recording requirements, they will discuss their concerns with the DSL.
- Child protection records will include a clear and comprehensive summary of the concern, details of how the concern was followed up and resolved and details regarding any action taken, decisions reached and the outcome.
- Child protection records will be kept confidential and stored securely.

2.4 Multi-Agency Working

 Delightful Gems Childcare Services recognises and is committed to its responsibility to work within the KSCMP multi-agency safeguarding arrangements. The management team and DSL will work to establish strong and co-operative local relationships with professionals in other agencies in line with statutory guidance.

2.5 Confidentiality and Information Sharing

- Delightful Gems Childcare Services is registered with the Information Commission Officer and recognises its duty and powers
 to hold, use and share relevant information with appropriate agencies in matters relating to child protection at the earliest
 opportunity as per statutory guidance outlined within WTSC 2018 and KCSIE 2021.
- The Data Protection Act 2018 and GDPR do not prevent the sharing of information for the purposes of keeping children safe. Fears about sharing information must not be allowed to stand in the way of the need to safeguard and promote the welfare

and protect the safety of children. DfE "Information sharing advice for safeguarding practitioners" (2018) provides further detail.

2.6 Complaints

- All members of our community should feel able to raise or report any concerns about children's safety or potential failures in
 our safeguarding regime. The setting has a complaints procedure available to parents, members of staff and visitors who
 wish to report concerns or complaints.
- Whilst we encourage members of our community to report concerns and complaints directly to us, we recognise this may not always be possible. Children, young people, and adults who have experienced abuse can contact the NSPCC 'Report Abuse in Education' helpline on 0800 136 663 or via email: help@nspcc.org.uk
- Staff can also access the NSPCC whistleblowing helpline if they do not feel able to raise concerns regarding child protection failures internally.
 - Staff can call 0800 028 0285 (8:00 AM to 8:00 PM Monday to Friday) or email help@nspcc.org.uk.
- The leadership team at Delightful Gems Childcare Services will take all concerns reported seriously and all complaints will be considered and responded to in line with the relevant and appropriate process.
 - Anything that constitutes an allegation against a member of staff or volunteer will be dealt with in line with section 8
 of this policy.

3. Specific Safeguarding Issues (New section)

Delightful Gems Childcare Services is aware of a range of specific safeguarding issues and situations that can put children at greater risk of harm. Whilst some of these issues may be more likely to involve older children, early years children may still be at risk at harm, for example where there are concerns involving family members.

• Where staff are unsure how to respond to specific safeguarding issues, they should follow the processes as identified in part 3 of this policy and speak with the DSL.

3.1 Peer on Peer Abuse

- All members of staff at Delightful Gems Childcare Services recognise that children are capable of abusing their peers, and that it can happen both inside and outside of the setting and online.
- Delightful Gems Childcare Services recognises that peer on peer abuse can take many forms, including but not limited to:
 - Bullying, including cyberbullying, prejudice-based and discriminatory bullying
 - o abuse in intimate personal relationships between peers
 - physical abuse which can include hitting, kicking, shaking, biting, hair pulling, or otherwise causing physical harm.
 - o sexual violence and sexual harassment
 - consensual and non-consensual sharing of nudes and semi-nude images and/or videos (also known as sexting or youth produced sexual imagery)
 - causing someone to engage in sexual activity without consent, such as forcing someone to strip, touch themselves sexually, or to engage in sexual activity with a third party
 - upskirting (which is a criminal offence), which typically involves taking a picture under a person's clothing without their permission, with the intention of viewing their genitals or buttocks to obtain sexual gratification, or cause the victim humiliation, distress or alarm
 - o initiation/hazing type violence and rituals
- Delightful Gems Childcare Services believes that abuse is abuse and it will never be tolerated or dismissed as "banter", "just
 having a laugh", "part of growing up" or "boys being boys" as this can lead to a culture of unacceptable behaviours and an
 unsafe environment for children.
- Delightful Gems Childcare Services recognises that even if there are no reported cases of peer on peer abuse, such abuse is still likely to be taking place.
- All staff have a role to play in challenging inappropriate behaviours between peers. Staff recognise that that some peer on
 peer abuse issues may be affected by gender, age, ability and culture of those involved, i.e. for gender based abuse, girls are
 more likely to be victims and boys more likely to be perpetrators.

Delightful Gems Childcare Services want children to feel able to confidently report abuse and know their concerns will be treated seriously. All allegations of peer-on-peer abuse will be reported to the DSL and will be recorded, investigated,

and dealt with in line with associated policies, including child protection, anti-bullying and behaviour. Children who experience abuse will be offered appropriate support, regardless of where the abuse takes place.

3.2 Child on Child Sexual Violence or Harassment

- When responding to concerns relating to child on child sexual violence or harassment, Delightful Gems Childcare Services
 will follow the guidance outlined in Part Five of KCSIE 2021 and the DfE 'Sexual Violence and Sexual Harassment Between
 Children in Schools and Colleges' guidance.
- Delightful Gems Childcare Services recognises sexual violence and sexual harassment can occur between two children of any
 age and sex. It can occur through a group of children sexually assaulting or sexually harassing a single child or group of
 children and can occur online and face to face (both physically and verbally). Sexual violence and sexual harassment is never
 acceptable.
- Reports will initially be managed internally by the setting and where necessary will be referred to Integrated Children's Services and/or the Police.
 - The decision making and required action taken will vary on a case by case basis, but will be informed by the wishes of the victim, the nature of the alleged incident (including whether a crime may have been committed), the ages and developmental stages of the children involved, any power imbalance, if the alleged incident is a one-off or a sustained pattern of abuse, if there are any ongoing risks to the victim, other children, adult students or setting staff, and, any other related issues or wider context.
- If at any stage the DSL is unsure how to proceed, advice will be sought from the Education Safeguarding Service.

3.3 Child Sexual Exploitation (CSE) and Child Criminal Exploitation (CCE)

- Delightful Gems Childcare Services recognises that CSE and CCE are forms of abuse that occur where an individual or
 group takes advantage of an imbalance in power to coerce, manipulate or deceive a child into taking part in sexual or criminal
 activity, in exchange for something the victim needs or wants, and/or for the financial advantage or increased status of the
 perpetrator or facilitator and/or through violence or the threat of violence. CSE and CCE can affect children, both male and
 female and can include children who have been moved (commonly referred to as trafficking) for the purpose of exploitation.
- If staff are concerned that a child may be at risk of CSE or CCE, immediate action should be taken by speaking to the DSL.

3.4 Serious Violence

- All staff are made aware of the indicators which may signal children are at risk from or are involved with serious violent crime.
 These may include unexplained gifts or new possessions, increased absence, a change in friendships or relationships with
 older individuals or groups, a significant decline in performance, signs of self-harm or a significant change in wellbeing, or
 signs of assault or unexplained injuries.
- Any concerns regarding serious violence will be reported and responded to in line with other child protection concerns.
 - The initial response to child victims is important and staff will take any allegations seriously and work in ways that support children and keep them safe.

3.5 So-Called Honour Based Abuse

- So-called 'honour'-based abuse (HBA) encompasses incidents or crimes which have been committed to protect or defend
 the honour of the family and/or the community, including female genital mutilation (FGM), forced marriage, and practices
 such as breast ironing.
- All forms of HBA are abuse (regardless of the motivation) and concerns should be responded to in line with section 3 of this
 policy. Staff will report any concerns about HBA to the DSL.

3.6 Preventing radicalisation

Delightful Gems Childcare Services is aware of our duty under section 26 of the Counter-Terrorism and Security Act 2015
(the CTSA 2015), to have "due regard to the need to prevent people from being drawn into terrorism", also known as the
Prevent duty and the <u>specific obligations</u> placed upon us as an education provider regarding risk assessments, working in
partnership, staff training, and IT policies.

- Delightful Gems Childcare Services recognises that children are vulnerable to extremist ideology and radicalisation and staff will be alert to changes in children's behaviour which could indicate that they may be in need of help or protection.
- Staff will report any concerns to the DSL who is aware of the local procedures to follow.

4. Supporting Children Potentially at Greater Risk of Harm (New section)

Whilst all children should be protected, some groups of children are potentially at greater risk of harm.

4.1 Safeguarding Children with Special Educational Needs or Disabilities (SEND)

- Delightful Gems Childcare Services acknowledges that children with special educational needs or disabilities (SEND) or certain health conditions can face additional safeguarding challenges and barriers for recognising abuse and neglect.
- Delightful Gems Childcare Services recognises that children with SEND may face additional communication barriers and experience difficulties in managing or reporting abuse or challenges. Children with SEND will be appropriately supported to communicate and ensure that their voice is heard and acted upon.
- To address these additional challenges, our setting will always consider implementing extra support and attention for children with SEND. The DSL will plan support as required.

5. Online Safety

- Delightful Gems Childcare Services identifies that the breadth of issues classified within online safety is considerable, but can be categorised into four areas of risk:
 - Content: being exposed to illegal, inappropriate or harmful content. For example pornography, fake news, racism, misogyny, self-harm, suicide, anti-Semitism, radicalisation and extremism.
 - Contact: being subjected to harmful online interaction with other users. For example peer to peer pressure, commercial advertising and adults posing as children or young adults with the intention to groom or exploit them for sexual, criminal, financial or other purposes.
 - Conduct: personal online behaviour that increases the likelihood of, or causes, harm. For example, making, sending
 and receiving explicit images (e.g. consensual and non-consensual sharing of nudes and semi-nudes and/or
 pornography), sharing other explicit images and online bullying.
 - o Commerce: risks such as online gambling, inappropriate advertising, phishing and or financial scams.
- Delightful Gems Childcare Services recognises that technology, and the risks and harms related to it, evolve and changes
 rapidly. The setting will carry out an annual review of our approaches to online safety, supported by an annual risk
 assessment which considers and reflects the risks our children face.

5.1 Staff Training

Delightful Gems Childcare Services will ensure that all staff receive online safety training as part of induction and that
ongoing online safety training and update for all staff will be integrated, aligned and considered as part of our overarching
safeguarding approach.

6. Staff Engagement and Expectations

6.1 Awareness, Induction and Training

 The DSL will ensure that all new staff and volunteers receive safeguarding and child protection training (including online safety), including information to ensure they are aware of the setting internal safeguarding processes and a range of safeguarding issues, as part of their induction. This training will be updated at least annually.

6.2 Supervision and Support

 The setting will ensure that members of staff are provided with appropriate supervision in accordance with the statutory requirements of Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS) 2021. Delightful Gems Childcare Services recognise regular, planned, and accountable supervision, which is a two-way process, offers support and develops the knowledge, skills and values of an individual, group or team. We see its purpose is to monitor the progress of professional practice and to help staff to improve the quality of the work they do, thus improving outcomes for children as well as achieving agreed objectives. Supervision also provides an opportunity to discuss sensitive issues including the safeguarding of children and any concerns raised about an individual or colleague's practice.

7. Safer Recruitment and Allegations

7.1 Safer Recruitment and Safeguarding Checks

• Delightful Gems Childcare Services is committed to ensure that develop a safe culture and that all steps are taken to recruit staff and volunteers who are safe to work with children and staff. Please see our Safer Recruitment policy for further information.

7.2 Allegations made against/concerns raised in relation to staff and volunteers

- Delightful Gems Childcare Services recognises that it is possible for any member of staff, including volunteers, contractors, agency and visitors to behave in a way that:
 - o Indicates they have harmed a child, or may have harmed a child
 - Means they have committed a criminal offence against or related to a child
 - o behaved towards a child or children in a way that indicates he or she may pose a risk of harm to children or
 - o behaved or may have behaved in a way that indicates they may not be suitable to work with children.
- In depth information regarding staff allegations can be found within our Procedures for Managing Allegations against Staff policy.
- Allegations should be referred immediately to Oluwabunmi Bakare who will contact the <u>Local Authority Designated Officer</u>
 (LADO) to agree further action to be taken in respect of the child and staff member. In the event of allegations of abuse being made against the manager, staff are advised that allegations should be reported to contact the LADO.
- Delightful Gems Childcare Services have a duty to inform Ofsted of any allegations of serious harm or abuse by any person
 living, working, or looking after children at the premises (whether the allegations relate to harm or abuse committed on the
 premises or elsewhere). We will also notify Ofsted of the action taken in respect of the allegations. Notifications will be made
 as soon as is reasonably practicable, but at the latest within 14 days of the allegations being made and are aware that to not
 do so would be an offence.

8. Opportunities to teach safeguarding

- Delightful Gems Childcare Services recognises that children learn best when they are healthy, safe, and secure, when their
 individual needs are met, and when they have positive relationships with the adults caring for them. Our setting will provide a
 welcoming, safe, and stimulating environment where children can enjoy learning and grow in confidence.
- We recognise that early years settings play an essential role in helping children to understand and identify the parameters of
 what is appropriate child and adult behaviour; what is 'safe'; to recognise when they and others close to them are not safe;
 and how to seek advice and support when they are concerned.
- Delightful Gems Childcare Services will provide age-appropriate educational opportunities to enable early years children to
 develop self-awareness, self-esteem, social and emotional understanding, assertiveness, and decision making so that they
 have a range of contacts and strategies to ensure their own protection and understand the importance of protecting others,
 including online.
